SUMMARY OF LISBON COUNCIL MEETING RULES

This summary is provided for guidance only. The complete council working rules may be found on the town website www.lisbonme.org on the Town Officials, Town Council page.

The meeting agenda is available from the town website under Council Agendas and Minutes.

- 1. Please note the order that agenda items may be acted upon by the Council, however, if necessary, the Council may elect to change the order of the agenda.
- The Council Chairman presides over the meeting. When the Chairman is not present, the Vice Chairman serves that function. The chair shall preserve decorum and decide all questions of order and procedure subject to appeal to the town council.
- 3. Public comment is not typically allowed during Council workshops. There may be occasions where public comment may be recruited, but normally, workshops are reserved for Council members to discuss and educate themselves on a variety of issues facing the Town. Prior to the conclusion of a workshop, if time permits, the chair may allow questions from the public.
- 4. During audience participation, anyone wishing to address council will wait to be recognized by the chair before beginning any remarks. Audience members will move to the lectern to address council, and shall provide name and address prior to addressing the council.
- 5. Note that "Consent Agenda" items (if there are any) are acted upon first, voted upon as a group, and will most often be voted on without discussion as these items often involve "housekeeping" issues (such as minor parking changes). On occasion "Consent Agenda" items are separated out as stand-alone action items by the Council to allow for more discussion.
- 6. Public comment on agenda items. General comments on agenda items should be made during audience participation. After introduction of an agenda item, appropriate motions, and time for explanation and council questions, the public may be allowed to comment on that agenda item at the discretion of the chair. During that period of time, the public comment shall address only the agenda item before council.
- 7. Action on agenda items. As each item on the agenda for any meeting is brought to the floor for discussion:
 - a. The town clerk reads the agenda item and the action being requested of council.
 - b. The sponsor of each item or, if there is no council sponsor, the town manager, or town staff, shall first be allowed to present their initial comments for consideration by the public and councilors.
 - c. Following this introduction of the issue, there will be time devoted to any questions of the sponsor or the town manager or staff regarding the agenda item which any councilor may have which would help to clarify the question presented by the agenda item. The chair may allow questions from the public during this time however; no debate or discussion of collateral issues shall be permitted.
 - d. When authorized by the chair, any additional public comment shall be no longer than two minutes per person and must be to request or furnish new or undisclosed information or viewpoints only.
 - e. Once an agenda item has been explained and clarified by any questioning, the discussion on the specific agenda item will remain with the council. Additional public comment, prior to final council vote; will only be allowed at the chairman's discretion.
- 8. New business is for the council to receive input on town matters not on the agenda for that meeting. It is not intended, nor shall it be construed as an opportunity for debate of previous agenda items or reinforcement of a point made by another speaker. Comments shall be to furnish new or undisclosed information or viewpoints and limited to a time period of two minutes or less and shall be directed through the chair.
- 9. If an "Executive Session" is conducted by the Council, State Statute prohibits public attendance for any discussion of the action to be addressed by the Council. Any action taken by the Council on any "Executive Session" matter must be acted upon in a public meeting, and may occur at the end of the "Executive Session" (which has no time element relative to the length of the discussion involved in the "session").

Agenda Item 2018-150 School Department Capital Reserve Request

Rick Green, Superintendent of Schools would like Council permission to utilize \$15,000 from the School's Capital Reserve Account to pay for the concept, design, and estimate to build a Performing Arts Center at L.H.S. in the former gymnasium. Superintendent Green mentioned the Capital Reserve Fund has allowed the Lisbon School Committee to use existing money for these projects without having to increase the taxpayer's local share. The current balance in the School's Capital Reserve Account is \$55,000 and this request would utilize an amount not to exceed \$15,000.

Recommendation

Authorize the Lisbon School Committee permission to expend an amount not to exceed \$15,000 from the School's Capital Reserve Account to pay for the concept, design, and estimate to build a Performing Arts Center at L.H.S. in the former gymnasium.

Agenda Item 2018-151 Request to Solicit Bids for Police Cruiser

Chief Hagan is requesting permission to solicit bids for one (1) new Ford Interceptor SUV that was approved in the current budget. His intent is to request bids for any leftover 2018 Ford SUV's if there are any available, rather than request 2019's which won't go into production for several months. If none are available then we would ask for bid proposals for 2019's.

The new cruiser will replace car #3, which is a 2015 Ford Explorer with over 90,000 miles on it. Included in his bid request would be an estimate for trade-in value on the 2015 Explorer unless the Town would prefer to keep this vehicle for use somewhere within the fleet.

Recommendation

Authorize the Police Chief to solicit bids for a new 2018 or 2019 Ford Interceptor SUV.

Agenda Item 2018-152 Asset Forfeiture Funds

M.R.S. Title 29 § 158-Asset Forfeiture must be used for law enforcement equipment. Federal Forfeiture funds may also be used for law enforcement equipment including firearms. Recently, Council authorized up to \$7,800 from unassigned fund balance to be used to purchase new rifles for the Police Department. We currently have a balance

of \$20,758.34 in the Drug Forfeiture account (Maine Assets-\$13,972.30, Federal Funds-\$6,786.04). Council may want to use forfeiture funds to purchase the weapons instead of unassigned fund balance. Staff did not recommend the use of forfeiture funds since there is uncertainty in replenishing these funds now and in the future. These assets have been used for matching grant funds for law enforcement equipment.

Recommendation

Council discuss and decide on whether they want to change the funding source to purchase the weapons.

Agenda Item 2018-154 Paving Bid

Given the lack of funds to complete the shoulder work associated with the 2017/2018 Paving Program, Mr. Martin would like to remove \$34,000 worth of funds from this seasons paving budget to fund the recent Shoulder Rehabilitation Bid.

A recommendation at the last Council meeting was to award the Paving contract to All State Asphalt. An amendment was made to adjust the contract down to the \$425,000 budget number. Given that All States number was nearly 10% lower, Mr. Martin would like to take advantage of that in the following way:

Award the Contract for \$588,691.62 with the caveat that we do not expend more than \$390,000 in this season's budget cycle. The contractor is willing to hold their prices into the next budget cycle. This gives us the opportunity to pave all the base that is ready under the current budget and we can pull the surface money to finish from next year's paving budget. We can then bid out the balance of the paving budget for 2019/2020 paving season.

Recommendation

To amend Votes 2018-143A and 2018-143B adopted at the July 10, 2018 meeting, by rescinding and replacing those Votes as follows: that the paving bid is awarded to All State Asphalt, Inc., in an amount not to exceed \$588,691.62, and that the amount to be expended for the project in the FY19 budget cycle shall not exceed \$390,000, with the remainder to be expended in FY20.

Agenda Item 2018-155 Award Bid for Paving Shoulder Work

The Town of Lisbon requested proposals for Shoulder Rehabilitation Services on approximately 6 miles of newly paved roads. Scope of services to include all equipment, fuel, and labor associated with the following:

Shoulder grading:

- Pull in shoulder material where applicable and grade to pavement. Compact.
- Spread new shoulder material supplied by Town with shoulder machine. Compact.
- Remove excess material with Skid Steer/Loader

Lawn Grading:

- Pull in lawn material where applicable and grade to pavement. Compact.
- Spread new lawn material supplied by Town with shoulder machine. Compact.
- Remove excess material with skid steer.

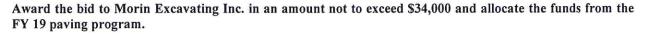
Only one bid was received and publicly opened on August 6th at 2:00 p.m.:

Morin Excavation of Auburn \$34,000 for 80 hours

This package will assist the Public Works department in regrading, rehabilitating, and rebuilding the shoulders on the roads in the road bond and last year's paving program. Mr. Martin recommends awarding the bid to Morin

Excavating Inc. and would like to remove \$34,000 worth of funds from this seasons paving budget to fund the recent Shoulder Rehabilitation Bid.

Agenda Item 2018-156 Auctions International, Inc. Contract

The Town of Lisbon is interested into entering into an agreement with Auctions International, Inc. for the sale of Town owned assets "As-Is, Where-Is, subject to our terms by online auction. This agreement will be in effect for two (2) years unless the seller wishes to terminate.

Recommendation

Authorize the Town Manager to enter into an agreement with Auctions International, Inc., to sell Town assets by online auction.

Agenda Item 2018-157 MTM Center – 15 Passenger Bus Purchase

After our research to replace the current bus with an ADA 14 passenger bus, we found three possible used buses located in Long Island New York. Based on discussions with the company, we recommend negotiating the best price for the 2010 Ford E 450 with 33,984 miles listed for \$27,900.

Recommendation

Authorize the purchase of a 2010 Ford E 450 with 33,984.00 in an amount not to exceed \$27,900.00 from Authorized Resources LTD.

Agenda Item 2018-160 Kelly Park Street Lights

Premier Development, LLC has requested that the Town Council accept the Street Lights located within the right-of-way known as "Premier Drive" and "Champagne Lane." The developer has provided information as requested by the Town Manager. The Planning Board voted at their regular Planning Board meeting on Thursday, August 9, 2018 to recommend that the Town Council accept the Street Lights as requested.

Recommendation

Accept the Street Lights within the right-of-way on Premier Drive and Champagne Lane and authorize the Town Manager to execute all documents to transfer the ownership.

Agenda Item 2018-163 Write-Off Taxes, Sewer, & Demolition Costs for 10 Union Street

On June 15, 2018, a sewer lien matured on 10 Union Street. As a result of the foreclosure, we are recommending the Council write-off the bad debt as of August 14, 2018.

PAVING BID AWARD

<u>INTRODUCTION:</u> Mr. Martin reported the paving RFP's were advertised on June 4, 2018 on the Town's website. In addition, the RFP's were sent to the following vendors:

All States Asphalt, Inc. Crooker Pike Industries Shaw Brothers Construction Lane Construction

Lisbon received the attached bids for the paving projects with the overall total summarized below.

All States Asphalt Inc.	\$588,691.62
Pike Industries	\$659,738.00
Lane	\$712,467.50
Crooker Construction, LLC	\$738,921.96
Shaw Brothers Construction	No Bid

Mr. Martin explained he was working off from a bid that was from two years ago, that the overall total for the projects discussed will be \$588,691.62, and that originally requested was \$425,000 for paving this year. These roads for the most part, are streets being disturbed by the Sewer Replacement program. At the time of planning though, pavement was about 25% cheaper than it is today, which is the major factor in the price increase.

VOTE (2018-143A) Councilor Albert, seconded by Councilor Larochelle moved to award the paving bid to All State Asphalt, Inc. in an amount not to exceed \$588,691.62.

Mr. Martin recommended awarding the paving bid to All States Paving. He suggested the Council push the surface paving into the next fiscal year; today's estimate would be approximately \$209,000. He said All States Paving has been notified about the funding dilemma. He said he had not had a chance to discuss all the options with them though.

Mr. Martin explained the escalated clause in the contract. Councilor Ward mentioned change orders are unknown at this point, but some pieces of this project might come in less while others more. Mr. Martin said this would not be known until the project moves along. He estimated the town would get all of the base work done this year, but we might have to hold off on surface paving.

The Council discussed using undesignated. Councilor Ward recommended staying within the budget since Council has asked all departments to do that. He pointed out that the Council unfortunately set itself up for an unreasonable expectation, which it built into this budget. He estimated it would take about \$200,000 more to complete the scope of work in the contract.

VOTE (2018-143B) Councilor Larochelle, seconded by Councilor Albert moved Amendment #1 not to exceed \$425,000.00. Amendment #1 passed - Vote 7-0.

Main Motion as amended to award the paving bid to All State Asphalt, Inc. in an amount not to exceed \$425,000. Order passed with Amendment #1 – Vote 7-0.

MTM CENTER BUS REPLACEMENT

<u>INTRODUCTION:</u> Mr. Stevens explained the Recreation Department purchased a used bus for the senior program for \$10,000 from Stewart's Auto about 5 years ago. The funds used were monies raised from programming, which had been carried forward.

The Recreation Department started the Moxie Car Show the same year to raise funds so that the repairs and fuel costs for the bus would be covered by funds collected from this event.

Recently the Recreation Department budget lines were restructured so now the Moxie Car Show has a line item budget for expenses and the revenue collected goes into unassigned fund balance. Prior to this restructure, the revenue from the previous year was carried forward into expense line 5600, and the Recreation Department spent only what it was able to raise.

In June, the Public Work's Department and Don's Automotive told the department the bus was not fit for the road; frame repairs and other repairs total over \$5,000. The Recreation Department would like to replace this bus for the Senior's. They average 3 to 4 trips a month and average around 200 to 250 miles per month. This bus is a 15-passenger wheel chair accessible bus. Renting vans for extended periods does not seem to be a viable option for the seniors because they have low ceilings, high steps, and constricted access to the back of these vans.

Mr. Stevens said he could find a used 15-passenger bus for about \$20,000. He pointed out the Recreation Department collected a considerable amount more revenue this year because their programs grew again.

<u>COUNCILOR COMMENTS</u>: Councilor Ward said this was an unfortunate situation to happen at the first part of this fiscal year. He said the easier fix for this situation is to go back to the car show for help to pay for the first year lease purchase on a replacement van. Mr. Stevens said we told people in the past that these funds would go back into a project like this. Mrs. Barnes said there might be funds left over from the previously designated server upgrade that could go towards this.

Councilor Larochelle cautioned that if these vans cost \$100,000 new and you are paying \$20,000 for it used, then 80% of the vans life has already been used and this is where maintenance issues overwhelm the budget and where we sell ourselves short.

Councilor Larochelle said if the current van is not usable then put it out for sale and get the cash now. Councilor Ward said that would be his recommendation, also.

VOTE (2018-144) Councilor Larochelle, seconded by Councilor Kolbe moved to go out to bid for a replacement van. Order passed - Vote 7-0.

Councilor Ward asked Mr. Stevens to let the Council know what is available and what is will cost. The Council supported renting vans prior to the Council's next meeting if necessary. Councilor Larochelle requested Mr. Stevens send out a bid package that is compatible with what the department already has.

SET PUBLIC HEARING FOR DANGEROUS BUILDINGS - 428 & 430 RIDGE ROAD

INTRODUCTION: Mrs. Barnes reported this hearing is to determine whether the residential structure, located at 430 Ridge Road, Lisbon, Maine, identified as Lot 14 on Tax Map R09 of the Town of Lisbon Tax Maps (the "Structure"), and further described in a Deed recorded in the Androscoggin County Registry of Deeds at Book 4645, Page 1, is a dangerous building or nuisance within the meaning of 17 M.R.S. § 2851, and if so, what is the appropriate remedy. The location of the Structure is also known as 921 Middle Road, Sabattus, Maine, identified as Lot 26 on Tax Map 2 of the Town of Sabattus Tax Maps. It is expected that the Town of Sabattus Board of Selectmen will also hold a hearing pursuant to 17 M.R.S. § 2851, et. seq. at the same place and same or similar time.

Mrs. Barnes explained that if the Council finds that the Structure is dangerous or a nuisance, it may order the appropriate corrective action, including but not limited to, demolition and removal of the Structure. If the corrective action is not taken by the deadline established by the Town Council's order, and no appeal is taken, the Town may take the corrective action at the Town's expense. The Town may also recover all of its expenses, including reasonable attorney's fees and costs, by means of a special tax or civil action. She said Sabattus has agreed to split the demolition costs and revenues from the sale by percentage based on assessment. Ms. Malloy and Mr. Douglass will need to get together to determine which structures are on which side of the town line before the next meeting. Councilor Larochelle said he would like to know prior to the next meeting.

This hearing provides an opportunity to present evidence as to why the Structure is not dangerous or a nuisance and/or to oppose any corrective action ordered by the Town Council; failure to attend may result in the waiver of certain rights with regard to this property. This hearing is also to determine whether the Structure poses a serious threat to public health and safety, within the meaning of 17 M.R.S. § 2856, and must be secured. If the Town secures the Structure, it may then recover all of their expenses, including reasonable attorney's fees and costs, by means of a special tax or civil action.

VOTE (2018-145) Councilor Larochelle, seconded by Councilor Kolbe moved to authorize the Notice of Hearing for September 18, 2018 at 6:00 PM at the Lisbon Town Hall regarding the dangerous building located at 428 & 430 Ridge Road, Lisbon a/k/a 921 Middle Road, Sabattus. **Order passed - Vote 7-0.**

OTHER BUSINESS

A. COUNCIL COMMITTEE REPORTS

- 1. School: Councilor Albert said he had nothing to report.
- 2. Planning: Councilor Ward said the Planning Board recently received a Subdivision Amendment from Johnson Wood Estates to include a new pedestrian right-of-way starting from Young Road and running between lot 8 and lot 9 and then along the property line to the river and set a public hearing on July 12. They also set a public hearing on July 12 to discuss a Subdivision Amendment from the Ricker Farm to add the addition of Lot 2C, which was originally part of Lot 2B. The two lots will share the current driveway used by Lot 2B.
- 3. Water Commission: Councilor Brunelle said he has been working with Shelly at the Water Department and that he would keep the Council informed of changes.
- 4. LDC: Councilor Larochelle reported they are moving forward.
- 5. Conservation Commission: Councilor Ward reported they have trimmed the Norway Maple and are getting ready to move forward with removing them.

- 6. Recreation: Councilor Kolbe reported about 200 kids attended Beaver Park today. She said 161 new registrants signed up for the Moxie 5k as compared to last year's 106.
- 7. County Budget: Councilor Ward said he had nothing to report until the end of August.
- 8. Library: Councilor Lunt said he had nothing to report.

B. TOWN MANAGER'S REPORT

Mrs. Barnes said she went out for fuel bids before the end of June. Propane came in about .10 cents higher, heating fuel is about .48 cents higher, and fixed pricing on diesel came in at 2.558 and gasoline fixed pricing is 2.2984. Last year gasoline was rack price. Diesel last year was 2.079, which is about .48 cents higher. She reported these prices were better than we she looked at it before; the fixed price maybe favorable for us.

COUNCILOR COMMUNICATIONS

Councilor Larochelle thanked the School Department for painting the flagpole and cleaning up the area there.

Councilor Larochelle reported the ATV club would like to address the Council for permission to access the downtown area differently by using Wing Street to come into the same location. He asked the Councilors if they had any thoughts. Councilor Albert asked if that meant they would be coming out from the pit on Wing Street and traveling down Route 9 to downtown. Councilor Larochelle said yes, but there should not be a question about traffic if it is done correctly. He indicated Chief Hagan had reviewed this request. Councilor Ward pointed out this happens from June 1 to October, sometime before hunting season begins. Mrs. Barnes said the Council would need to schedule a public hearing to discuss the ordinance changes and adopt a new ATV map. Councilor Lunt recommended Route 9 be posted with extra signage and warnings about ATV crossings.

The Council came out of executive session at 8:35 PM and the meeting resumed.

VOTE (2018-146B) Councilor Crawford, seconded by Councilor Larochelle moved to approve up to \$20,000 from the Business Façade Grant Program for applicants, Robert and Aline Strout, for 273 Lisbon Street contingent upon the sale of the property to the applicants.

It has been disclosed that Aline Strout works for the Parks & Recreation Department and that the Façade Grant will go to the building and that her position in the Parks & Recreation Department has no influence in the decision in the administration of the Façade Program.

Diane,

With the sweeper in disrepair I have compiled a few options that we should discuss with Council. We are at a point where a decision should be made to reinvest in the department and upgrade this unit. This unit was on Capitol Replacement Program I found in the former Directors files to be replaced last year. It looks like during the last budget cycle it was pushed out 3 more years.

Given our ATRC affiliation and the regulations it causes us to fall under, I feel we should be proactive and upgrade to a unit that complies with air quality standards. Specifically in regards to Silica Dust. Silica dust is exacerbated during the sweeping process.

As I expressed earlier, I feel our sweeping program is far from what it should be. Some of that may fall on workload vs. available personnel, but it has a lot to do with equipment reliability.

It would be my recommendation to council to entertain the idea of upgrading this unit.

At the council's direction, we could explore options. There are several programs for purchase or lease packages. There are also Municipal Bid programs that we may be able to take advantage of. These can involve Federal Diesel initiatives to partnering with regional "Bid Consortiums" similar to what we do with AVCOG.

Another alternative is to outsource to Contractors. I only found one contractor that was interested or would return a call. Most contractors have sweepers for their own use and do not do it as a stand alone business. Some of the negatives associated with doing this is cost and availability.

Contracting with other towns is expensive, and done at overtime rates and outside of the hours of their sweeping programs. But can be done later into the season.

After our unit started failing this season, we explored a lot of these options. It would have been into the 10's of thousands of dollars to do. We did not have the budget for it.

The other alternative is to repair the machine we have. I have included the cost of repairs below. While still viable, I think it is setting us up for short term failure. It may however, give us a window of opportunity to get the rest of our sweeping program done.

Current Sweeper is a 2006.

I would like to request that the council reconsider their award of this seasons paving contract.

Given the lack of funds to complete the shoulder work associated with the 2017/2018 Paving Program, I would like to remove \$34,000 worth of funds from this seasons paving budget to fund the recent Shoulder Rehabilitation Bid.

A recommendation at the last Council meeting was to award the Paving contract to All State Asphalt. An amendment was made to adjust the contract down to the \$425,000 budget number. Given that All States number was nearly 10% lower, I would like to take advantage of that in the following way:

Award the Contract for \$588,691.62 with the caveat that we do not expend more than \$390,000 in this season's budget cycle. The contractor is willing to hold their prices into the next budget cycle. This gives us the opportunity to pave all the base that is ready under the current budget and we can pull the surface money to finish from next year's paving budget. We can then bid out the balance of the paving budget for 2019/2020 paving season.

Sec. 50-261. - Purpose.

The purpose of this ordinance is to authorize the operation of ATVs on designated roadways in the Town of Lisbon.

(C.M. of 11-14-2017, <u>V. 2017-281</u>)

Sec. 50-262. - Definitions.

Accompanied by adult. "Accompanied by an adult" means, with respect to operation of an ATV, within visual and voice contact and under the effective control of a child's parent or guardian or another person 21 years of age or older.

All-terrain vehicle or ATV. "All-terrain vehicle" or "ATV" means a motor-driven, off-road, recreational vehicle capable of cross-country travel on land, snow, ice, marsh, swampland or other natural terrain. "All-terrain vehicle" or "ATV" includes, but is not limited to, a multitrack, multi-wheel or low-pressure tire vehicle; a motorcycle or related 2-wheel, 3-wheel or belt-driven vehicle; an amphibious machine; or other means of transportation deriving motive power from a source other than muscle or wind. For purposes of this subpart, "all-terrain vehicle" or "ATV" does not include an automobile as defined in 29-A M.R.S. § 101(7); an electric personal assistive mobility device as defined in 29-A M.R.S. § 101(22-A); a truck as defined in 29-A M.R.S. § 101(88); a snowmobile; an airmobile; a construction or logging vehicle used in performance of its common functions; a farm vehicle used for farming purposes; or a vehicle used exclusively for emergency, military, law enforcement or fire control purposes.

ATV access route. For the purpose of this ordinance, an ATV access route shall be defined as a public way maintained by the Town of Lisbon and designated by the Town Council as an ATV access route. ATV's are only to be used by the public on such designated public ways to gain access to the Lisbon ATV Trail System.

Lisbon ATV Trail System. A designated path commonly used and maintained for ATVs which is administered, in part, by the Town of Lisbon in association with a designated ATV Trail Organization.

Public way. "Public way" means a way, owned and maintained by the State, a county or a municipality, over which the general public has a right to pass.

(C.M. of 11-14-2017, V. 2017-281)

Sec. 50-263. - Use and operation of Lisbon ATV access routes.

- (a) Operation of an ATV within the Town of Lisbon shall comply with 12 M.R.S. § 13157-A, Operation of ATVs.
- (b) Use and operation of an ATV on a public way shall not obstruct or interfere with the use of the way by traffic or pedestrians.
- (c) The Lisbon ATV access routes will be posted as OPEN from June 1st thru October 31st from sunrise to sunset. All other times/dates the ATV access routes will be posted as CLOSED.
- (d) Each year, in the month of December, prior to the opening of the ATV access routes and Lisbon ATV Trail System, the designated ATV Committee shall be designated or re-designated by the Lisbon Town Council and an annual review of the ATV access routes and Lisbon ATV Trail system shall be conducted. The review will be performed by the Town Manager, Chief of Police or designated officer, Public Works Director, and a designated representative of the ATV Trail Committee.
- (e) Operators under the age of 18 must have a valid driver's license and/or be accompanied by an adult age 21 or older.

(C.M. of 11-14-2017, V. 2017-281)

Sec. 50-264. - ATV access routes.

The town council does hereby designate the following portions of public ways as ATV access routes, with travel limited to the extreme right of the public way in the same direction as motor vehicle traffic. The posted speed limit for ATV's on ATV access routes shall be ten miles per hour and signs designating the ATV access route and the speed limit shall be conspicuously posted. ATV access routes have been established using guidelines under 12 M.R.S. § 13157-A § 6(H).

- (1) Miller Road.
- (2) Ferry Road (between Miller Rd. and Bretton Rd.).
- (3) River Road.
- (4) (3) Wagg Road.
- (5) (4) County Road.
- (6) (5) Burrough Road (from Rte 125 to Bowdoin Town Line).

- (9) (11) Huston Street (from intersection of Scottsdale Street westerly on Huston Street to end).

- (11) (12) Capital Avenue.
- (12) (13) Summer Street (from Main Street, Rte 125, to intersection of Edgecomb Road).
- (13) (14) Edgecomb Road (from intersection of Summer Street westerly to start of Transmission Line trail).

(14) (15) Cotton Road.

(15) (16) Pinewoods Road (from intersection of Cotton Road Southwesterly to the Pinewoods Road Recreational fields).

(C.M. of 11-14-2017, V. 2017-281)

Sec. 50-265. - Signs.

Designated ATV access routes shall be posted along the public ways to clearly define the approved access route. Posted signs shall include the 10 MPH speed limit and the designated ATV access route. The designated ATV Trail Organization shall be responsible for production, placement and overall maintenance of the signage. This shall be done in coordination with and approval of the Lisbon Public Works Department.

(C.M. of 11-14-2017, V. 2017-281)

Sec. 50-266. - Penalty for violation of division.

Penalties for violation of this division shall be as follows:

- (1) On the occasion of the first violation, the individual violator will be issued a warning, which shall contain the name and address of the violator, the nature of the violation and the location of the violation.
- (2) On the second and subsequent violations:
 - a. Second violation-\$50.00 fine.
 - b. Third violation-\$100.00 fine.
 - c. Fourth and subsequent violations-\$200.00 fine.
- (3) This ordinance shall be enforced by the Lisbon Police Department.

Re: Town Authority to Authorize and Regulate Marijuana Establishments

Date: August 10, 2018

This memorandum summarizes the Town of Lisbon's options for authorizing and regulating both adult use (i.e., recreational) marijuana businesses and medical marijuana businesses, in light of recent legislative changes.

I. Adult Use (Recreational) Marijuana Businesses

In May, the Legislature adopted the Adult Use Marijuana Act, which amends and supersedes the citizen-initiated recreational marijuana law that voters approved in 2016. The law allows four different types of adult use establishments to be licensed by the State Department of Administrative and Financial Services:

- 1. *Marijuana stores* authorized to sell marijuana and marijuana products directly to consumers.
- 2. Cultivation facilities authorized to grow, prepare and package marijuana.
- Products manufacturing facilities authorized to blend, infuse or extract
 components of the marijuana plant to make marijuana products such as
 ointments, tinctures or edibles, for sale to marijuana stores or other
 marijuana products manufacturing facilities.
- 4. *Testing facilities* authorized to conduct research, analysis and testing of marijuana and marijuana products for contamination, potency and safety.

The new law prohibits any of these adult use establishments from operating in a municipality unless and until the municipality has voted to authorize their operation. 28-B M.R.S. §402(1). The authority to determine whether one or more types of adult use marijuana



facilities will be allowed within the Town of Lisbon rests with the Town Council. The Town does not have authority to consider any applications for authorization of adult use marijuana establishments unless the Council votes to authorize such establishments.

The Town Council has three general options for its approach to regulating adult use marijuana businesses. First, the Council could choose not to authorize any type of adult use marijuana establishment, in which case none of these establishments would be allowed to operate in Lisbon. Second, the Town could adopt a simple ordinance authorizing the operation of some or all types of adult use marijuana establishments. This simple approach would leave the operation of authorized adult use marijuana establishments to be governed entirely by the State of Maine licensing process. Finally, the Town could take a more active role in regulating adult use marijuana establishments. The law provides that municipalities have broad home rule authority with respect to regulating adult use marijuana establishments, including, but not limited to, the authority to adopt the following types of regulations and restrictions:

- 1. General authorization or limitation of marijuana establishments, including the right to limit the number of any type of adult use marijuana establishment that may be authorized to operate within the Town;
- 2. Land use regulations, and
- Municipal licensing requirements, including the adoption of municipal licensing fees.

28-B M.R.S. §401.

The threshold issue for consideration by the Council is whether the Council wishes to authorize one or more types of adult use marijuana establishments within the Town. If the Council does choose to authorize one or more types of adult use marijuana establishments, the Council should consider the following additional issues:

- Does the Council wish to consider limitations on the number of any of the authorized types of adult use marijuana establishments that may operate? This limitation can be adopted in the ordinance authorizing one or more types of marijuana establishments.
- 2. Does the Council wish to consider restrictions on the location of some or all of the authorized types of adult use marijuana establishments, or requiring performance standards for such establishments? If so, the Council may request the Planning Board to propose amendments to the Zoning Ordinance, as permitted under Section 70-7(a) of the Zoning



Ordinance. The Council could develop either a new stand-alone ordinance governing the location and/or performance standards for such establishments, or the Council could adopt amendments to the existing Zoning Ordinance. If the Council were to consider amendments to the existing Zoning Ordinance that are not recommended by the Planning Board, current ordinance provides that such amendments must be approved by a two-thirds majority vote of the Council. Lisbon Code of Ordinances at §70-7(b). Any zoning regulations must be consistent with the Town's Comprehensive Plan, and must be adopted in accordance with the notice and hearing requirements of state law and local ordinance. See 30-A M.R.S. §4352.

3. Does the Council wish to require that adult use marijuana establishments be licensed by the Town, either through existing business licensing ordinances or through marijuana-specific licensing requirements? If so, state law requires that any licensing fees must reasonably reflect the Town's costs associated with the licensing procedure and licensing enforcement. 30-A M.R.S. §3702.

II. Medical Marijuana Businesses

Municipal regulation of medical marijuana businesses is governed by the Maine Medical Use of Marijuana Act. During the Second Special Session of the 218th Maine Legislature in June, the Legislature adopted two different bills that clarify the authority of municipalities to regulate medical marijuana facilities. While both of the bills were vetoed by Governor LePage, the Legislature overrode the vetoes of both bills on July 9, 2018.

L.D. 238, which was passed as emergency legislation and is now in effect, provides that municipalities have the authority to regulate the following types of medical marijuana businesses under their home rule authority, except that municipalities do not have the authority to prohibit or limit the number of registered primary caregivers:

- Registered primary caregivers authorized to cultivate medical marijuana for qualifying patients.
- 2. Registered dispensaries authorized to cultivate and dispense medical marijuana to qualifying patients and caregivers.
- 3. *Marijuana testing facilities* authorized to test medical marijuana for contamination and potency.



4. *Manufacturing facilities* authorized to manufacture marijuana products and marijuana concentrate for medical use.

LD 1539, which was passed as nonemergency legislation, will become effective 90 days after adjournment of the Legislature's Second Special Session. This statute provides that municipalities have the authority to regulate the above listed types of medical marijuana businesses, as well as registered caregiver retail stores, under their home rule authority. The statute authorizes caregivers to operate one retail store to sell marijuana to qualifying patients for the patients' for medical use. While L.D. 1539 provides that municipalities do not have the authority to prohibit or limit the number of registered primary caregivers, the statute prohibits registered caregiver retail stores, registered dispensaries, marijuana testing facilities and manufacturing facilities not operating on the effective date of the legislation from beginning to operate in a municipality until the municipal legislative body has voted to adopt or amend an ordinance allowing such entities to operate. Municipalities are not authorized to prohibit such entities that are already operating with municipal approval prior to the effective date of L.D. 1539.

The effective date of L.D. 1539 will be no earlier than November, 90 days after the Second Special Session of the 218th Legislature is finally adjourned. Because L.D. 1539 has not yet taken effect and Lisbon does not have currently have any ordinances in effect that limit or regulate medical marijuana businesses, there is a possibility that new marijuana medical businesses could be established in Lisbon between now and the date that L.D. 1539 takes effect. Therefore, the Council may wish to consider whether to adopt an emergency moratorium on registered caregiver retail stores, registered dispensaries, medical marijuana testing facilities and medical marijuana manufacturing facilities, to allow time for the Town to decide whether or not to allow new businesses in these categories. The maximum time period for a moratorium would be 180 days. A moratorium could not apply to registered caregivers that do not operate a retail store, because current law provides that municipalities do not have authority to prohibit or limit the number of registered primary caregivers

Regardless of whether the Council decides to adopt a temporary moratorium on medical marijuana businesses until L.D. 1539 takes effect, the Council will need to determine whether to allow registered caregiver retail stores, registered dispensaries, marijuana testing facilities and manufacturing facilities once L.D. 1539 takes effect. As with adult use marijuana establishments, the Town Council has three general options for its approach to regulating these types of medical marijuana businesses. First, the Council could choose not to authorize any of these types of medical marijuana establishments, in which case none of these establishments would be allowed to operate in Lisbon once L.D. 1539 takes effect, unless they already were lawfully established. Second, the Town could adopt an ordinance that simply authorizes some or all types of these medical marijuana establishments. This simple approach would leave the operation of authorized medical marijuana establishments to be governed entirely by the State regime for regulation of



medical marijuana. Finally, the Town could take a more active role in regulating medical marijuana establishments.

Both L.D. 238 and L.D. 1539 provide that municipalities have home rule authority to regulate medical marijuana establishments. Although not specifically stated in these new laws, the home rule authority to regulate medical marijuana business likely includes authority to adopt (1) limitations on the number of any type of medical marijuana establishment that may be authorized to operate within the Town (except for registered primary caregivers which cannot be prohibited or limited by number); (2) land use regulations, including zoning and performance standards, applicable to medical marijuana businesses; and (3) licensing requirements including licensing fees applicable to medical marijuana establishments.

As with adult use marijuana businesses, the threshold issue for consideration by the Council is whether to authorize one or more types of the following medical marijuana establishments within the Town of Lisbon: registered caregiver retail stores, registered dispensaries, marijuana testing facilities or manufacturing facilities. If the Council does choose to authorize one or more types of these medical marijuana establishments, the Council should consider the following additional issues:

- 1. Does the Council wish to consider limitations on the number of registered caregiver retail stores, registered dispensaries, marijuana testing facilities or manufacturing facilities that may operate?
- 2. Does the Council wish to consider restrictions on the location of some or all of the authorized types of medical marijuana establishments, or requiring performance standards for such establishments?
- 3. Does the Council wish to require that medical marijuana businesses be licensed by the Town, either through existing business licensing ordinances or through marijuana-specific licensing requirements?

Depending on which direction the Council wishes to proceed on the issues summarized in this memo, I am available to assist with drafting and review of proposed ordinances.

New Laws on Medical Marijuana Retail Stores

Many municipalities have been struggling with how to handle requests from registered caregivers to operate medical marijuana retail stores. Existing law has been completely silent on the legal status of these stores and unclear as to municipal authority to regulate them. These ambiguities have created a breeding ground of confusion – some towns have refused to permit them, others have permitted them on the assumption they must, and others have taken no action either way. Two new laws provide some clarity, but may also pose a problem before both laws finally become effective. Here's a summary:

On July 9, 2018 the Legislature enacted two amendments to the Maine Medical Use of Marijuana Act which recognize municipal home rule authority to regulate registered caregivers. The smaller of the two, PL 2017, c. 447 (LD 238), was enacted as an emergency and took effect immediately – municipalities may now, by ordinance, regulate registered caregivers.

The larger of the two, PL 2017, c. 452 (LD 1539), is a sweeping reform to the entire medical marijuana statute. One part authorizes registered caregivers to operate medical marijuana retail stores. However, caregivers may only do so if the municipality has voted to allow them generally. In other words, once this law takes effect, new medical marijuana retail stores are prohibited unless the municipal legislative body affirmatively votes to allow their operation. This is similar to the municipal "opt-in" requirement for adult use marijuana establishments under the Adult Use Marijuana Act.

But herein lies the rub: this opt-in requirement will not apply to medical marijuana retail stores until LD 1539 takes effect, which will not be until sometime in October 2018. In addition, LD 1539 expressly grandfathers stores "operating with municipal approval" prior to the law's effective date. This means medical marijuana retail stores will have a few months to become grandfathered before new stores are prohibited from operating without a municipal vote to "opt-in."

For municipalities that want to prohibit medical marijuana retail stores, or for municipalities that may want to allow them but need time to amend local ordinances to regulate them, we recommend adopting a moratorium ordinance. Since LD 238 is already in effect, there is no doubt that a moratorium applying to registered caregivers is now authorized.

Note that LD 238 also imposes new state registration requirements for medical marijuana manufacturing facilities. In addition LD 1539 will grandfather medical marijuana dispensaries, testing facilities and manufacturing facilities that are "operating with municipal approval" prior to the law's effective date (October 2018). Municipalities wanting to regulate or prohibit these establishments should consult with local counsel about including them in a moratorium ordinance.

Two New Laws Recognize Home Rule Authority to Regulate Medical Marijuana Operations State and Federal Relations Department Update

Yesterday, the Legislature overrode Governor Lepage's veto of LD 238, An Act To Amend the Maine Medical Use of Marijuana Act, as well as his veto of LD 1539, An Act To Amend Maine's Medical Marijuana Law, finally enacting both proposals into law.

Each bill replaces the relatively limited local control authorizations in the pre-existing Medical Use of Marijuana Act, which had allowed for municipal school setback moratorium ordinances and regulation of dispensaries, with express recognition of the home rule authority to comprehensively regulate registered medical marijuana caregivers, dispensaries, and testing and manufacturing facilities. Two limitations are imposed on home rule: municipal prohibitions on registered caregivers, as well as limitations on the number of registered caregivers, are not allowed.

Descriptions of these newly enacted laws are found below. LD 238 is designated "emergency" and therefore became effective July 9, whereas LD 1539 becomes effective 90 days after the Legislature finally adjourns the second special session that is currently underway.

LD 238 - "An Act To Amend the Maine Medical Use of Marijuana Act" Emergency Enacted, Public Law 2017 chapter 447 (July 9, 2018)

This bill provides for accredited third-party testing of medical marijuana, authorizes the manufacture of medical marijuana products using non-hazardous extraction and concentration processes, and requires processors who utilize hazardous substances to be certified as safe by a state-licensed professional engineer. The manufacture of medical marijuana products using non-hazardous extraction and concentration processes is authorized for all persons, subject to any forthcoming state rules, with "tier 1" processors authorized to possess up to 40 pounds of harvested marijuana, while "tier 2" processors are authorized to possess up to 200 pounds of harvested marijuana. The same is true for processing utilizing hazardous substances for extraction, provided the processors are certified as safe by a state-licensed professional engineer and have notified the state in advance of their intent to engage in marijuana extraction using inherently hazardous substances.

(Note: The term "primary caregiver" is replaced with "registered caregiver" in LD 1539).

LD 1539 – "An Act To Amend Maine's Medical Marijuana Law" Enacted, Public Law 2017 chapter 452

This bill re-writes much of Maine's Medical Use of Marijuana Act. Amendments made to the Act as a result of this legislation include the following:

Local Control. The Act's pre-existing municipal school setback and dispensary regulation authorities are replaced with express recognition of the comprehensive home rule authority to regulate registered medical marijuana caregivers, dispensaries, and testing and manufacturing facilities. Two general limitations are imposed on home rule: municipal prohibitions on registered caregivers, as well as limitations on the number of registered caregivers, are not

allowed. Another limitation, described below, grandfathers caregiver retail stores operating on the effective date of this law while applying a municipal opt-in requirement to storefronts aiming to open after the effective date.

Qualifying Patients. Four key changes are made with respect to patient activities:

- Patients may now receive written prescription certifications to use medical marijuana for any medical condition their physician believes may be alleviated by the patient's use of marijuana;
- (2) The maximum per-patient prescription limit is expanded from 2.5 ounces to up to 2 pounds, and the amount that may be possessed by patients is expanded from 2.5 ounces to up to 8 pounds;
- (3) Each patient may grow a maximum of 6 mature plants, 12 immature plants, and unlimited seedlings;
- (4) Patients may share seeds and plants with one another;
- (5) Patients may use medical marijuana in certain assisted living and residential care facilities provided the use is consistent with facility policies; and
- (6) Patients may designate multiple primary caregivers rather than only one caregiver.

Caregivers. Seven key changes are made with respect to caregiver activities:

- (1) The term "primary caregiver" is replaced with a new distinction between un-registered and registered caregivers. Caregivers who only serve two household or family members are not required to register with the state. All other caregivers are required to register with the state and are referred to in the new law as "registered caregivers";
- (2) Registered caregivers are authorized to operate retail stores;
- (3) Each caregiver may grow a maximum of 30 mature plants, 60 immature plants, and unlimited seedlings;
- (4) Caregivers are allowed to employ any number of assistants (under the pre-existing Act employees were capped at one person per designated patient served);
- (5) Caregivers may transfer products between one another (under the pre-existing Act caregivers were only allowed to transfer products to dispensaries);
- (6) Tracking and reporting on seed and plant sourcing and sales is required of registered caregivers and dispensaries;

Municipal Opt-in Requirement and Grandfathering. Registered caregiver retail stores, registered dispensaries, marijuana testing facilities and manufacturing facilities not operating on the effective date of the legislation are prohibited from beginning to operate in a municipality until its legislative body has voted to adopt or amend an ordinance or approve a warrant article allowing such entities to operate. Municipalities are not authorized by the terms of this law, however, to prohibit those entities already operating with municipal approval prior to the effective date.

Dispensaries. This law authorizes the state to issue six additional dispensary certifications (in addition to the existing eight) until 2021, after which time there will be no cap on the number of dispensary certificates issued statewide. The law also removes the previous requirement that dispensaries operate as non-profits.

State Verification For Code Enforcement. State officials are required to verify within two business days the validity of registration identification cards and conduct authorized pursuant to that registration upon the request of a code enforcement officer, and the location at which the conduct is authorized if necessary to verify the card to the code enforcement officer. The code enforcement officer, or other municipal officer in municipalities without code enforcement officers, are required to keep the information received confidential.

Inspections. State inspection authority is limited to registered caregivers, dispensaries, testing, and manufacturing facilities. Such inspection is authorized on demand of the Department of Health and Human Services, but is disallowed in areas where marijuana-related activities are not taking place and, in the case of registered caregivers, when the caregiver is not present. Two or more absences on the part of the caregiver are grounds for state revocation of their certification.

Immunity. The pre-existing immunity for dispensary employees and directors is extended to registered caregivers and their employees as well as to hospitals and long-term care facilities and their directors, employees or agents.

Testing. Accredited third-party testing of medical marijuana is authorized.

Extraction and Concentration. The same language included in LD 238, authorizing the manufacture of medical marijuana products using non-hazardous extraction and concentration processes for all persons, subject to any forthcoming state rules, is included in this legislation as well. "Tier 1" processors authorized to possess up to 40 pounds of harvested marijuana, while "tier 2" processors are authorized to possess up to 200 pounds of harvested marijuana. The same is true for processing utilizing hazardous substances for extraction, provided the processors are certified as safe by a state-licensed professional engineer and have notified the state in advance of their intent to engage in marijuana extraction using inherently hazardous substances.

Diane,

I met with Scott Kelly on site this morning to review anticipated acceptance of the Street Lighting system and his anticipated work to separate the Entrance Sign and Irrigation system from the Street Lighting system. There are 11-25' poles and heads on Premier Drive and 6-20' poles and heads on Champagne Drive. The parking lots are fed from the Buildings.

All of the system appears to be in fine working order. Scott mentioned that we may want to convert the system to a photocell controller versus the timer that is currently in use.

I noted a discrepancy on the asbuilts and he is having them corrected immediately and sent to me. Scott has already sent me service information on the poles and heads.

It would be my recommendation to move forward with the process and send to the Planning board for the approval and submission to the Council for final acceptance.

I have included a list of work that will need to be done after final acceptance by the Council.

Kelly Park responsibility:

- a) Install Meter socket and main power disconnect.
- b) Separate the Sign and irrigation from the Lighting system.
- c) Verification of Separation and power up of systems

Towns Responsibility:

a) Upon Council approval, call CMP for new service account and meter installation.

Kelly Park Street Light Acceptance

Town of Lisbon is prepared to consider acceptance of the street lights constructed in Kelly Park. Because the street lighting plan was designed for an industrial rather than a residential use, and therefore is not consistent with all standards set forth in Town ordinance, the Council has amended the Town's street lighting ordinance to allow for Town acceptance. The revised ordinance, at Lisbon Code of Ordinances Section 46-167(d), was adopted by the Council on February 20, 2018, and provides as follows:

There are many varied potential street lighting needs to be served in the Village Zone because it encompasses the most diverse areas of town in building style, density, setback variances and public infrastructure availability. If recommended by the planning board and approved by the town council, the town may accept a street lighting plan in the Village Zone that is not consistent with all standards in this article if the street lighting plan meets the overall intent of this article, seeks to maintain public safety and will provide an economic and aesthetic benefit to the town beyond its cost for maintenance.

In connection with the Town's consideration of the acceptance of responsibility for the street lights, Premier Development, LLC has provided the following:

- 1. A plot plan showing the as-built condition of the street lighting system, including
- 2. Historical costs of maintenance and operation of the street lights. Six months of electric bills ranging from \$102.63-\$271.49
- 3. Proposed deed for conveyance of street lighting system to Town
- 4. A petition requesting that the Town accept the street lighting plan

Everything is in order for the Planning Department move forward with their recommendation to the Town Council.

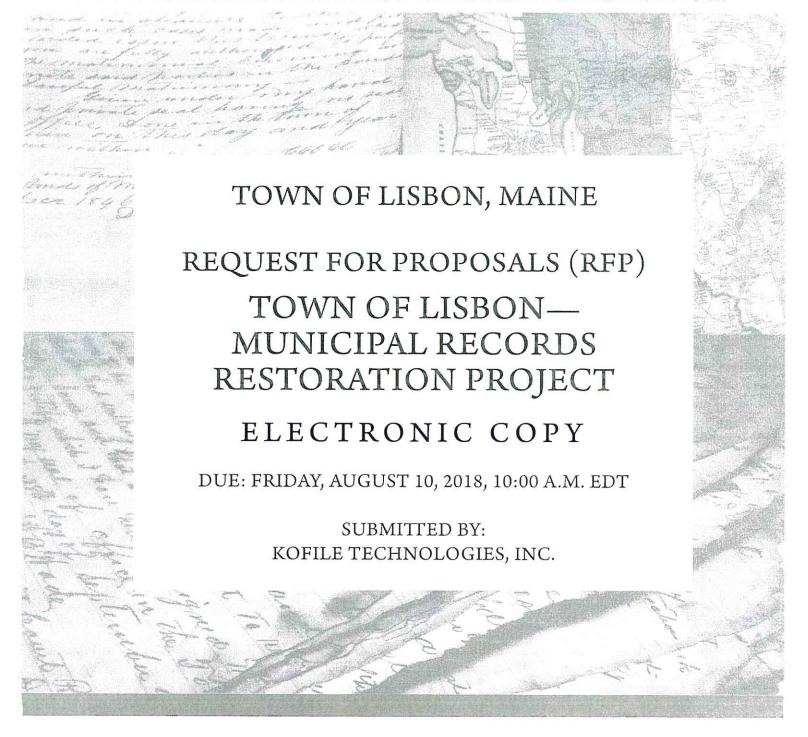

<u>LDC (Lisbon Development Committee)</u>: The LDC group met on June 21st where the group did a site walk in the Village Street area that was postponed in April. There will be more information about the scope of work for the Village area in the next couple of months.

Another project that was discuss with LDC was the purchasing of new benches for the downtown area to help as part of continued efforts to help with the appearance. Benches are now located at various places along Main Street. This project was funded through the Façade Grant.

Community Development Block Grant:

<u>Downtown Revitalization Falls Streetscape Project:</u> The new sidewalk project for the falls

is almost completed and looking great.



The demolition and redevelopment of the Miller Block (Rusty's Lantern) project has begun. The new Rusty's Lantern will be another great addition as part of the downtown revitalization project.

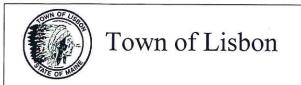

In the month of June the Fire Department had 40 calls for service (includes inspections and various investigations, such as unpermitted burns). 6 of which were mutual aid calls. The Department responded to 10 First Responder (Medical) calls. We also responded to only 2 calls to assist Lisbon Emergency, with either lifting or as a driver.

During the month of June we responded to 3 fires within a structure in the Town of Lisbon. One located on Lisbon St, one on Donna Dr, and one on Village St. Two of which were small and were caught early with the significant fire on Lisbon St. The Lisbon St fire had the potential to be disastrous, with a large family living within the home with no smoke detectors. Thankfully, no one was injured.

Normally, the two different fire companies hold separate business meeting each month. For the month of June we held a department wide meeting, bringing both groups together. This is the first meeting like this in a few years. The plans are to do these or a regular basis.

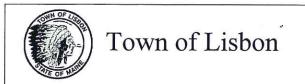
Crews continue to train. This month they worked on hose deployments and hose loads. Newer members were able to get a feel for what it's like to handle these lines while under pressure.

The month of July was a little busier. Calls for service was at 48 calls for service. 8 were mutual aid calls. For First Responder calls, we responded to 6 calls. Only once did we go out to assist Lisbon Emergency.

On the 18th, we responded to a fire on Marc Drive. The fire displaced a family of 3. The call came in at 8 in the morning with personnel availability is low. We relied upon assistance from Lewiston, Durham, and Topsham at the scene. One person, a child, went to the hospital to be checked for smoke inhalation. No other injuries.

This month crews did Extrication training. Using vehicles provided by Gearheads, the crews practiced techniques necessary to remove victims that may be entangled in a vehicle after a crash. Some of the members had never used the tools before and it gave them a great introduction into this specialized area.

For the fiscal year of 2018 the total number for calls for service was 415. An analysis for the period of 07/01/2017 to 06/30/18 showed that the Department's busiest times are





from 8am to 6pm, with the busiest day of the week being Monday. Just as a note, the busiest times fall when the number of available firefighters are at the lowest.

A break down on the calls that the Fire Department responded to over the course of the month of June and July are attached. These break downs are how NIFRS (National Incident Reporting System) codes the calls and can be a little misleading. For example, a mutual aid call for a structure fire will still be coded as a building fire.

I have also attached a copy of the fiscal year Incident breakdown and of the incident numbers by time and day for your review.

August Report to Council Police Department

In the months of June and July the Lisbon Police Department received or responded to two thousand and forty three (2,043) calls for service. The calls for service ranged from arrests and traffic related summonses to checking on closed businesses, motor vehicle crashes, and other criminal investigations. Lisbon officers arrested or issued criminal/civil summonses to sixty two (62) persons, covered twenty eight (28) reportable motor vehicle crashes, conducted ninety six (96) investigations, and stopped four hundred and sixty four (464) traffic stops.

On June 30th Dan Turcotte resigned his position as a Communications Officer with the Lisbon Police Department after a twenty-year career with the agency. Dan will be sorely missed and the search for a full-time replacement is currently nearing its' conclusion.

In June, the Department released the 2018 series of police trading cards. Each officer has been issued a number of trading cards with their photograph and a brief biography on the back. There are also versions with the Lisbon PD cruiser and one specifically for canine Moxie. These cards are a great way for our officers to meet Lisbon area youth and start building positive relationships that will hopefully last a lifetime.

July saw the completion of another successful Moxie Days. All officers were called upon to work additional hours to ensure public safety throughout the Friday and Saturday events which was completed without complaint. This year the police department requested the assistance of the Androscoggin County Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) to assist with traffic direction and control during the parade. This assistance was greatly appreciated as it freed much needed personnel to address public safety concerns in other areas. Thank you again to Lisa Ward, Joanne Potvin, and all of the CERT volunteers for their part in making this a safe and happy event for the community.

On July 16th the Police Department was happy to welcome Nicholas Kauffman as this agencies newest law enforcement officer. Nicholas is a Bridgton native, member of the Maine Army National Guard and comes to us after serving as a Windham Correctional Officer for the last three years. Officer Kauffman, and Officer Chandler Field (hired in April) will be attending the Maine Criminal Justice Academy starting in August for 18 weeks of training to become certified law enforcement officers.

TOWN CLERK AND ELECTION DEPARTMENT JULY 2018

48 vital records were issued in June. 9 Marriage Licenses were completed in the State's DAVE program. The vital record report was mailed to Augusta, along with the \$83.60 in State fees and the \$2.00 online fee collected for an order.

12 dog were licensed in June. The dog report was mailed to Augusta, along with the \$71 State fee.

The June 12, 2018 Election Results were filed with the state. The results were typed and put in our municipal record book. 1,766 ballots were cast. We completed the voter history project, which updates the voter's file indicating that they voted in the June Primary Election. 205 Absentee ballots were cast. 35 New voter registration cards were taken Election Day and entered into the computer, along with 145 party and address changes, and 25 removed from Lisbon, totaling 205 records updated. All of those cards have been scanned, but not filed yet. All the election bills have been paid and the school was billed for its share.

Information was posted on the Election Webpage for the annual municipal Election coming up on November 6. We are linked to the state's on-line absentee ballot request system so voters can request ballots on-line about mid-August. Nomination Papers will be available July 30 and have to be filed by 4:30 PM on September 7.

The following projects are underway:

- 1. Updating Boards and Committees
- 2. Business Filings Book V: Index updated
- 3. Code Book current to April 17, 2018. I send the recent updates to Municipal Code as well so changes will be posted on-line.
- 4. Annual renewal appointments we made by the Town Manager and those oaths are being administered by staff and Andrea Tapley.
- 5. Website: Council Agendas and documents along with Council Minutes are regularly posted to our town website. Final agendas are posted to the Live Streaming site.
- 6. The Annual Town Report has been posted online as well.
- 7. Vault Project: Developing an index is going well.
- 8. Restoration Project: RFP's will go out to our Website, MMA, Kofile, etc. for quotes and a work plan.

Renewal business licenses were processed, permits were mail, and original licenses were filed. We have one pending FOA request, which will need the Finance Director to conduct research before its completed.

Communication from the Lisbon Water Department Superintendent

Current activities:

Mill Street Bridge: Reed and Reed are in the process of installing two new hydrants as part of the water main improvements. The new hydrants will enable us to maintain water quality on these dead ends until the main is completed later this fall. This is especially important as to prevent bacteriological growth and maintain dissolved iron concentrations below the maximum contaminate level per the Environmental Protection Agency Safe Drinking Water Act.

Route 196 Paving Improvements: Water Department Staff is working towards meeting MDOTs requirements in preparation of the paving project. We need to remove or lower 32 valve boxes prior to the mill and fill project. Restoration of the valve boxes will start when directed by MDOT.

Distribution Maintenance: Flushing is expected to start in the next few weeks. We will continue with the Unidirectional method. The uni-directional method was started in December of 2017 with excellent results.

Once flushing has been completed we will be rating all public hydrants for firefighting capacity. Hydrant color coding will change as appropriate. The Lisbon Fire Department will receive an update with the new data upon completion of the testing.

Winter maintenance of hydrants will start in mid to late October and will continue until the danger of freezing has passed in the spring.

Collaborate with the Sewer Dept.during their collection system improvements with regards to water infrastructure.

Plant maintenance: We are working on implementing a corrosion control program. Once approval is received from the Maine Division of Environmental Health final design and construction will be completed by our staff.

New Employees: The Water Dept. has hired two new water operators; Don Stevens, and Tim Schulz. Both operators bring many years of water experience with them.

Dear Diane,

Here is a scope of work in succession that would need to be done to improve this intersection. I started at the Farewell mill entrance and measured along curbline to the Bridge. Jumped across to the Park and ride sidewalk. Measured that around on to Rt196 to the first Driveway. Jumped across to the South side of 196 by the first driveway. Measured all the way around past Walts to the end of Brick sidewalk on Spring St. Then jumped across Village street and measured from Bonafide Street all the way around onto Rt 196 and stopped at the end of Brick Sidewalk on other end of Bonafide Street.

As you can see by my initial estimate we do not have enough funds to complete the project right now. So my recommendation would be to start at Farewell Mill and do the Sidewalk around to the Bridge. (435') Bus Stop and possibly Sidewalk Lights/Street Light? Then I would start at Bonafide Street on Rt 196 and go as far as we can around the corner onto Village Street. (500') Bus Stop and possibly Sidewalk lights/Street Lights. Bench's?

One thing I haven't confirmed yet is how much ADA adjustments we need to make.

Pedestrian Crossing upgrades should be done asap.

Note: If we convert to new street lights, we may not need as many. I have made that assumption in my estimate.
